

Forested Flyways is a Habitat Conservation Program of the American Forest Foundation that links members of the American Tree Farm System (ATFS) with conservation groups and agencies to improve and restore wildlife habitat on family forestlands.

Currently, Forested Flyways is working with the American Bird Conservancy, Environmental Defense, US Forest Service, US Fish & Wildlife Service, and Mississippi Fish & Wildlife Foundation to improve pine habitat for the gopher tortoise and other species associated with the historically open forests of the South.

By connecting family forest owners with existing technical and financial assistance programs, Forested Flyways improves wildlife habitat and water quality, while encouraging landowners to sustainably manage their forest land and develop strategies to resist the increasing pressures from urban sprawl and development.
