## 2012 Audit Finding Summary

The ATFS certification program and this year's Assessment States have successfully completed the 2012 Assessment. This assessment included third-party review of the Northeast, South, and West-Central regions, including the New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Montana, Illinois and Wyoming State Tree Farm Programs. Auditors interviewed landowners, reviewed management plans and assessed management on the ground for conformance with the 2010-2015 Standards of Sustainability, in addition to their review of each State Program's inspections process and documentation. The findings of the audit included examples of good management practices, opportunities for improvement and minor nonconformities. In addition, based on strong performance in this year's assessments, several open nonconformities and opportunities for improvement that were issued in years past were also closed in each region. The auditors approved the ATFS Corrective Action Plans. The assessment teams in each state, as well as our national office, are in the process of implementing the Corrective Action Plans. At the close of this year's assessments, each State Tree Farm Program has now undergone an assessment: this is a significant accomplishment for the Tree Farm Program! Thanks to everyone on the 2012 State Assessment Teams for coordinating a successful audit. We are also looking ahead to the 2013 audit and beginning the planning process for next year's assessments in West Virginia, Maine, Vermont, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, Colorado and New Mexico.

## Recent Interpretations: Eligibility

The AFF Woodland Certification Committee recently issued interpretations and guidance to accompany the 2010-2015 ATFS Standards of Sustainability Eligibility. These interpretations relate to ATFS Certification on properties with long-term timber and mineral leases or in cases where wilderness designation or conservation easements are in effect. Landowners leasing timber rights to third parties are eligible for certification but only if they retain full control and decision-making authority over their forest management, in accordance with the objectives stated in their management plan. Landowners may also certify forestlands with active mineral

leases to third parties as long as the mining/extraction activity does not render the property no longer in conformance with the ATFS Standards. Conservation easements and wilderness designations are important for protecting future land use and important forest values. These agreements also reflect management decisions, consistent with landowner's objectives. Areas under easement or non-regulatory designations are a part of many working forest systems and are encompassed by the ATFS Standards. Thus, areas under easement or wilderness designation should be included in the total certified acreage. These recent interpretations serve as guidance and reference for inspecting foresters.

# Farm Bill Update

The House of Representatives failed to vote on Farm

Bill legislation, meaning the current Farm Bill expired September 30, 2012. What does this mean for forest owners? Many of the conservation tools and resources forest owners rely on will continue to operate with funds Congress appropriated earlier this year; however, there are a few programs which will either cease to exist from a budgetary perspective or won't be able to enroll new acreage. Additionally, all of the policy improvements, streamlined programs, and budget reductions that were included in both the House and Senate Agriculture Committees' Farm Bills were not made into law. meaning keeping the Farm Bill status guo is costly and ineffective. Worst of all, landowners who rely on these programs now lack the much-needed certainty on the long-term future of these programs. We will need your help, more than ever, to call on Congress to pass a Farm Bill when they return back to D.C. following the election.

## **Moving Toward the Future**

Support the Keep the Forest in the Family Campaign Keep an eye out for our latest letter, which you'll find in your mailbox in a few weeks! This letter outlines the key tools and resources we provide to Tree Farmers and the work we are doing to fight for better policies in Washington, on behalf of Tree Farmers. ATFS is fighting for a fix to the Estate Tax, so families across the country won't be faced with tax burdens that force their children and grandchildren to sell their land or harvest timber prematurely. We have already raised more than \$75,000 to sustain the research component of our Keep the Forest in the Family Campaign, but are relying on your support to reach our \$270,000 goal. With your help, we can ramp up our coordinated lobbying, media outreach, grassroots, and research efforts when Congress is debating this issue post-election.

And we've already had success—last month, Representatives Diane Black (R-TN) and Mike Michaud (D-ME) introduced H.R. 6439, the "Keep the Forest and the Farm in the Family Act of 2012," to help provide additional estate tax relief to Tree Farmers, farmers, and ranchers. So far, 21 members of Congress have agreed to support H.R.6439, and you can visit <a href="https://www.familyforestaction.org">www.familyforestaction.org</a> to ask your House member to cosponsor.

## Stumped?

Question: I am working with a landowner that would like to use prescribed burning. How does this fit in with the ATFS Standards for Certification?

Answer: Prescribed fire, including controlled burning of piles and windrows and broadcast applications, is an important tool in the forester's toolbox and the ATFS Standards include Performance Measures for the use of fire. When used, prescribed burning must align with the landowner's objectives, their management plan and local laws. In many states, the state forestry agency maintains a fire permitting system and provides training to landowners, which may be a requirement for obtaining a permit to burn. The permits may also reflect local regulations that limit the number of fires in a county in a given day.

A written prescribed burning plan is not required under the ATFS Standard but is recommended and may be required by the state forestry agency to obtain a permit. These plans typically include mapping of the areas to burn, accounts of fuel and required weather conditions and fire control measures.
