The Benefits of Family Forests



Forestry in Montana

Landcover: Montana has an estimated 15.8 million acres of forestland.

<u>Ownership:</u> Over 3.6 million acres of Montana's forestland are owned by 38,000 family forest owners. <u>Certified Tree Farms:</u> There are 427 certified tree farms in the ATFS program for a total of 176,167 acres.


Jobs: The forest products industry employs 11,091 workers, or almost 35% of the manufacturing workforce—making it the largest manufacturing sector in the state. The industry provides an annual payroll of \$252 million.

Wood: In 2007, 75% of total timber harvested in Montana came from private lands (38% from non-industrial private owners), while only 14% came from national forests.

<u>Wildlife:</u> Montana forests are habitat for 3 species listed as endangered under the ESA: the grizzly bear, canada lynx, and the bull trout.

Recreation: There are 197,000 licensed hunters in Montana who benefit from well-managed forests.

National Statistics and Facts

<u>Landcover:</u> More than half (56%) of the nation's forests are privately owned.

Jobs: Every 1,000 acres of private forests supports eight well-paying jobs.; each job created in private forests creates an additional 2.95 jobs.

<u>Carbon:</u> Wood building materials—the majority of which are from private forests—reduce energy use and carbon emissions in manufacturing from 70% to 88%.

Wood: Family forests are the economic lynchpin of small towns and rural areas around the nation.

Water: More than 25% of our drinking water originates in private forests.

Wildlife: 60% of all at-risk species rely on America's private forests.
