Tree Farm History

- Started by Weyerhaeuser in Washington in 1941
 - Prevent oppressive federal regulation of private forest lands
 - Show that private owners can manage forests responsibly
 - Address major problems like property taxes and wildfire
 - USFS wanted to stop Tree Farm but SAF supported in 1942 editorial
- American Forest Products Industries
 - 1991 American Forest Foundation
- Certification since 2000
 - 2008 endorsed by PEFC
- Much more than just certification!
 - Best program for family forest landowners



A 3rd-party verified unbroken trail of accountability that confirms the share of wood from certified sustainable sources

Big Picture Benefits

Landowner Eligibility

- Willing to participate in internal and external assessments


Tree Farm in Michigan

- Michigan joined Tree Farm in 1949
 - 70th anniversary was June 10, 2019
- 1,300 Tree Farmers in Michigan
 - 900 Certified and 400 Pioneer
 - 190 Grossman and 80 Green Timber
- 515,000 acres in 80 counties
 - Mean is 300 acres; Median is 70 acres




- 235 Inspectors trained or re-trained since 2015
 - Only 105 active Inspectors (two-year window)
 - Only 36 foresters did an inspection in 2019



Types of Tree Farm Inspections

- 1. Initial Inspection to Join Tree Farm
 - Initiated by landowner or forester
 - Easiest when writing a forest management plan
- 2. Re-Inspections for Current Tree Farmers
 - Required and Optional samples from AFF
 - Voluntary request by Tree Farmer
 - Goal: visit each landowner once every five years
- 3. Third Party Audits
 - Every five years 2014, 2019, 2024

Protocol – Initial Inspection

1. Talk to your Regional Coordinator

- If before the inspection regional coordinator creates new Tree Farm ID in the database and sends pre-populated 004 form
- If after the inspection you can send "generic" 004 form to regional coordinator for them to enter in the database

2. Site Visit and Landowner Interview

- Walk in the woods to observe forest
- Complete 004 form together
- Give landowner a sign

3. Submit 004 Form

- Email "Pre-populated" form to inspectors@forestfoundation.org
- Email "Generic" form to your regional coordinator

Protocol - Reinspection

1. Talk to your Regional Coordinator

- If you were previous inspector, you can assign the inspection to yourself and create pre-populated 004 form
- If you were <u>not</u> the previous inspector, get your regional coordinator to assign inspection to you and send you 004 form

2. Site Visit and Landowner Interview

- Walk in the woods to observe forest
- Complete 004 form together
- Make sure landowner has a nice sign

3. Submit 004 Form

• Email "Pre-populated" form to inspectors@forestfoundation.org

Inspection: New Tree Farm ID

- 1. Only the Administrators or Regional Coordinators can create new Tree Farms in <u>www.ATFSdatabase.org</u>
 - Tree Farmer ID: provide complete contact information name, address, phone, email, etc
 - Tree Farm ID: provide forested acres and legal description for each non-contiguous parcel
 - MI-5000a, MI-5000b, MI-5000c, MI-5000d
- 2. Admin or Regional assigns inspection, then downloads and sends a pre-populated 004 form to inspector for each unique Tree Farm



Inspection: Review Forest Management Plan

- No restrictions on author
- Contain all required elements?
- No expiration date in Tree Farm, so is the plan <u>current</u>?
- Tree Farm does not ask for or store copies of plans
 - Except for those 17 Tree Farmers selected for audits every five years

Standard 1: Commitment to Practicing Sustainable Forestry. Landowner demonstrates commitment to forest health and sustainability by developing a forest management plan and implementing sustainable practices.

<u>Performance Measure 11</u> - Landowner shall have and implement a written forest management plan consistent with the size of the forest and the scale and intensity of the forest activities.

Indicator 1.1.1 - Management plan shall be active, adaptive and embody the landowner's current objectives, remain appropriate for the land certified and reflect the current state of knowledge about natural resources and sustainable forest management.

Indicator 1.1.2 - Management plans shall describe current forest conditions, landowner's objectives, management activities aimed at achieving landowner's objectives, document a feasible strategy for activity implementation and include a map accurately depicting significant forest-related resources.

The forest management plan shall demonstrate consideration of the following resource elements: forest health, soil, water, wood and fiber production, threatened and endangered species, special sites, invasive species and forests of recognized importance. Where present and relevant to the property, the plan shall describe management activities related to these resource elements.

Where present, relevant to the property and consistent with landowner's objectives, the plan preparer should consider, describe and evaluate the following resource elements: fire, wetlands, desired species, recreation, forest aesthetics, biomass and carbon.

[Update all required components from Indicator 1.1.2 in the forest management plan as needed.]

Indicator 1.1.3 - The Landowner should monitor for changes that could interfere with the management objectives as stated in management plan. When problems are found, reasonable actions are taken.

Inspection: Walk in the Woods

- Look for conformance to Standards
- Observe recent management activities
- Ground truth the plan and map
- Answer landowner questions
- Take a few photos for social media



Inspection: Fill Out 004 Form

- Answer ALL relevant questions
- Landowner must meet ALL required Standards to become or remain certified
- Landowner should retain records
 - plan, contracts, records, notes, etc.
- Leave hard copy of 004 Form with Tree Farmer
 - Cc them on email to inspectors@forestfoundation.org

Results of Tree Farm Inspection

- 1. Certified or Recertified Tree Farm
 - Fully compliant with Standards of Sustainability
- 2. Pioneer Tree Farm
 - Moving towards, but not in full compliance
 - Indefinite time period
- 3. Decertification
 - No longer interested in program or compliance
 - Change in ownership, deceased, etc.
 - Specify reasons for decertification

Eliminate "Greenwashing"!!

Re-Inspection by Phone or Email

- Inspector was at property within past 180 days
- No management activity since visit
- 004 Form completed and submitted
- Not possible for Initial Inspection
 - Do the field visit when collecting data to write a plan
 - Phone interview to fill out the 004 form when the plan is done

Cost of Tree Farm Inspection

- No charge to landowner for *Tree Farm inspection*
- Inspector may charge for other services
- Tree Farmer not obligated to hire Inspector for other services (plan, timber sale, etc.)
- MI Tree Farm Committee pays \$100-\$200 to Inspector for on site inspection
 - Submit payment request form to Scott Robbins

Inspection Reimbursement

- Initial Inspection
 - All foresters \$100
 - Combine with FSP!
- Reinspection
 - Public forester \$100
 - Private forester \$200

Co-Payment with FSP Cost Share

PLAN PREPARATION COSTS AND DISCOUNTS

The cost to develop a Forest Stewardship Plan is determined by the plan writer and agreed upon by the landowner. A partial cost share, made possible with funding from the United States Forest Service, may be available through an annual grant to the plan writer. The cost share formula is "\$200 per plan plus \$0.50 per forested acre up to an annual maximum of \$2,500 per landowner." Landowners should expect to pay for a significant portion of the total plan costs. The DNR must report matching funds to the Forest Service so landowners must report the amount that they contribute to the total cost of the plan. This form is not a legal contract.

Standard 2: Federal Forestry Laws

- Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (1947)
 - Pesticide use, storage, and disposal
- National Historic Preservation Act (1966)
 - State Historic Preservation Office
- Clean Water Act (1948, 1972)
 - Protect water quality from point and non-point pollution
- Endangered Species Act (1973)
 - Protect Threatened and Endangered species and their habitat

What would you do?

During a field Inspection, you notice that the Tree Farmer is in the process of building a 25' long permanent bridge over a year-round stream on their property for recreational use.

You ask if they have the required stream crossing permit from the DEQ, and the landowner tells you that, "I can't stand the DEQ and I won't waste \$50 on their stupid permit!"


Standard 3: Reforestation & Afforestation

PM 3.1 - <u>Shall</u> be achieved by a suitable process that ensures adequate stocking levels.

- Adequate stocking
- Desired species
- 5 years or reasonable time







What would you do?

While inspecting a Tree Farm, you observe a regeneration harvest that was carried out six years ago in one of the stands in accordance with the forest management plan.

Natural regeneration was called for in the plan, but due to heavy deer browse, it does not yet meet minimum stocking requirements.

Standard 4: Air, Water & Soil Protection

PM 4.1 - Shall meet or exceed state Best Management Practices

- Implement applicable state forestry BMPs
- Minimize disturbances in riparian zones and wetlands

- Mechanical
- Biological
- Chemical
 - Compliance with all pesticide laws for use, storage and disposal

PM 4.3 – Use of prescribed fire

Shall conform with objectives and state and local laws

Improper use, storage, and disposal of chemicals

Ineffective installation of water quality BMPs



What would you do?

During an Inspection, you notice a gully filled with dozens of mostly empty oil and pesticide containers.

The Tree Farmer tells you that he dumps leftover oil and herbicides into the gully and it is OK because it is clay soil.

Standard 5: Fish, Wildlife, Biodiversity & Forest Health

PM 5.1 - Shall protect habitats and communities occupied by Threatened & Endangered species as required by law.

- Research to determine known occurrences
- Protect habitat and avoid harm to species
- Document findings and activities in plan

PM 5.1 – T&E Species

- What should a landowner do to find out if they have threatened or endangered species on their Tree Farm?
 - 1. Check federal list
 - 2. Check state database
 - 3. On site inspection
- Michigan Natural Features Inventory
 - DNR checks MNFI database to the quarter, quarter section
 - Public access to the county and watershed level

- "Threatened" species in danger of becoming endangered
 - May not be killed, harassed, handled, or possessed without a permit
 - "Special Concern" declining but not legally protected

<u>Should</u> address the desired species and/or desired forest communities

- Fish, wildlife, and/or plant
- Refer to objectives
- Consult sources of information
- Integrate into management



PM 5.3 – Forest Health

Should make practical efforts to promote forest health

- Prevention, control, and response
 - Wildfire
 - Invasive species
 - Pests/Pathogens
 - Unwanted vegetation
- Document: date and source

 - Consult with experts
 - Review available info

- FORI not identified in plan
- Invasive species not identified in plan
- Desired species not described in plan

What would you do?

The management plan does not say anything about Forest of Recognized Importance. The Tree Farm is an 80-acre jack pine forest along the Au Sable River east of Grayling.

Standard 6 - Forest Aesthetics

PM 6.1 - Landowners <u>should</u> manage for visual impacts consistent with size, scale and intensity of activities.

- Apply visual quality measures
- Compatible with appropriate silvicultural practices
- MI Right to Forest Act





What would you do?

You are inspecting a Tree Farm that abuts a major county road. Stand Two, a mature aspen stand that is visible to the road, is scheduled to be clearcut next year to create young forest wildlife habitat in accordance with the management plan. No buffer zone is planned.

Standard 7 - Protect Special Sites

PM 7.1 – Activities <u>shall</u> consider and maintain any relevant special sites.

- Research, locate, identify, and protect on the ground
- Document in plan and show on map

- Historical
- Archeological
- Cultural
- Geological
- Biological
- Ecological



Recent Nonconformities

• Special sites are not described in the forest management plan or located on the map



What would you do?

A Tree Farmer has an 80-acre Tree Farm in Huron County. Most of the Tree Farm is lowland hardwoods, but there is a 4 acre "lakeplain wet prairie" in a gap in the southwest part of the forest.

The landowner loves four wheeling and you can see lots of deep ruts and two tracks going through the non-forested lakeplain wet prairie.

Standard 8:

Forest Product Harvests and Other Activities

PM 8.1 – Landowner <u>should</u> use qualified natural resource professionals and contractors

Seek qualified professionals and contractors

- Require Liability and Workers' Comp insurance
- Use contracts MSUE Bulletin #E1656
- Retain contracts and records of harvests



Standard 8:

Forest Product Harvests and Other Activities

PM 8.2 – Landowner <u>shall</u> monitor harvests and other activities to ensure conformance with objectives

- Activities conducted in accordance with objectives
- Activities maintain potential of property
- Sustainably produce forest products and other benefits

Recent Nonconformities

- Not using written contracts
 - not required, but still best practice
- Incomplete or poorly written contracts
 - May impact ability to produce future forest products



What would you do?

During the inspection, the Tree Farmer asks if she is required to harvest timber to be in Tree Farm.



Tree Farm History

- Started by Weyerhaeuser in Washington in 1941
 - "Recognition" that private owners can manage forest land
 - Avoid oppressive federal regulation of private forest lands
 - Address property taxes and wildfire problems
 - USFS wanted to stop it, SAF supported it

- American Forest Products Industries
 - 1969 American Forest Institute
 - 1986 American Forest Council
 - 1991 American Forest and Paper Association
 - American Forest Foundation



"Tree Farm" in Historical Context

- 1830 to 1900 exploitation and degradation (timber, fires, taxes)
 - 1887 Independent Forestry Commission (1899 SFC, 1921 MDC, 1968 DNR)
 - 1891 Forest Reserve Act to establish national forests
 - 1897 Organic Act national forests for forest protection, water and timber
- 1900 to 1925 conservation era retain and manage forests
 - 1902 MSU Forestry Department (forestry education)
 - 1903 Higgins Lake and Houghton Lake State Forests (nursery in 1904)
 - 1905 United States Forest Service (professional foresters)

"Tree Farm" in Historical Context

- 1925 to 1950 restoration: fire control and tree planting
 - 1925 Commercial Forest Program
 - Tax break for planting trees
 - 1935 "Wood is a crop. Forestry is tree farming."
 - Gifford Pinchot, 1935, First Chief of the US Forest Service
 - 1941 American Tree Farm System
- 1950 to 1975 managing for timber
 - Beginning of the environmental movement

"Tree Farm" in Historical Context

1975 to 2000 - multiple use (water, wildlife, recreation)

- Societal concerns about forest sustainability
- 1990 Forest Stewardship Program
- 1992 Earth Summit in Rio (deforestation, climate, biodiversity)
- 1994 Montreal Process (basis of forest certification)
- 2000 to present ecosystem management
 - 2000 Standards of Sustainability
 - "Certification" of forest and forest products
 - Written forest management plans required
 - Standards updated in 2005, 2010, and 2015
