Background

Many teachers are passionate about outdoor education and want to take their students outside into the forest, but most schools in Michigan have limited transportation funds for field trips. If transportation funding is a barrier to getting students in the woods, then foresters, loggers, forest landowners and the forest products industry can help address this problem by paying for the bus.

Wheels to Woods provides up to \$350 per bus and \$1,000 per school to take students outside into the forest for an educational field trip. Small grants should be easy for teachers to obtain and report. Wheels to Woods promotes understanding forest ecosystems, forest management and forest products, and also allows teachers flexibility to create their own educational field trip. Any educational topic is allowed, as long as the learning takes place outside in the forest. Incorporating outdoor education curriculum like Project Learning Tree and involving natural resource professionals are strongly encouraged, but are not required for Wheels to Woods funding.

Wheels to Woods did not invent transportation funding for school forest field trips. The Oregon Forest Resources Institute provided transportation funding for schools long before Wheels to Woods started in 2016. Wheels to Woods is hosted by the Michigan Tree Farm Committee, a non-profit organization that supports the American Tree Farm System, a forest certification program for family forest landowners.

Donors and Finances

Seventeen agencies, organizations, companies and individuals generously donated \$35,250 in support of Wheels to Woods in its first year – *thank you!* Wheels to Woods awarded \$31,433 for 179 buses and 92 trips in 2016. Actual transportation costs paid to schools were often lower than the awarded costs estimated prior to the trip. Wheels to Woods has \$3,817 in uncommitted funds at the end of 2016.

Accomplishments in 2016

Wheels to Woods funded 92 field trips to Michigan's forest in 2016 that impacted 8,279 people.

- 6,820 students experienced a forest
- 304 teachers included outdoor education in their curriculum
- 81 outdoor educators hosted field trips
- 1,074 parents chaperoned the field trips
- \$31,433 awarded only \$4.61 per student and \$175 per bus

The Wheels to Woods application form was distributed to the Michigan Project Learning Tree network of 3,000 classroom teachers and outdoor educators in February, 2016. Wheels to Woods awarded funds to 108 of the 114 applications received in 2016, providing readily accessible funding for PreK-12 schools to take their students to the woods (16 trips are scheduled for 2017). Wheels to Woods does not limit the teachers and their educational purposes for a field trip. Wheels to Woods promotes forest ecosystems, forest management and forest products, yet its built-in flexibility produced some very creative field trips and dozens of additional opportunities for foresters and loggers to connect with teachers and outdoor educators.

- most field trips were urban schools visiting forests in suburban parks and nature centers
- 10 schools and 498 students in Detroit experienced a forest
- 11 Upper Peninsula schools, although any rural or urban school is welcome to apply
- 18 schools visited their own school forest
- 6 schools visited a forest on federal lands (national forest, lakeshore, wildlife refuge)
- 3 trips included 41 blind or visually impaired students exploring the forest

Host Organization and Partners

The Michigan Tree Farm Committee is the host and fiduciary partner for Wheels to Woods. Many people at Tree Farm and other partner organizations worked hard to establish Wheels to Woods. The Michigan Tree Farm Committee is a 501c3 non-profit to receive tax deductible donations and disburse small grants to schools. Karen Serfass, the treasurer, sent out dozens of payments in 2016 and included a hand-written thank-you note to the teachers. The American Forest Foundation connects the Michigan Tree Farm Committee to a network of 3,000 Project Learning Tree educators in Michigan. The Michigan Tree Farm Committee links schools with loggers and the forest products industry through the Sustainable Forestry Initiative and the Michigan Forest Products Council. The Michigan Tree Farm Committee connects schools to more than 140 foresters and 850 landowners who participate in the American Tree Farm System in Michigan. Wheels to Woods is a team effort to get more students outside to discover, explore and learn about Michigan's beautiful public, private and urban forests.

Goals and Objectives for 2017

Wheels to Woods has a single goal – to remove the barrier of insufficient funds for transportation costs for schools and other youth groups to go on educational field trips to nearby public or private forests.

Wheels to Woods has ten specific objectives in 2017 to connect foresters, loggers, forest landowners and the forest products industry with schools, teachers, students, parents and outdoor educators.

- 1. Get urban and rural students outside into the forest to experience nature
- 2. Educate students about forests, forest management and forest products
- 3. Support teachers and schools for field trips to a forest or forest products company
- 4. Connect foresters and loggers with teachers and outdoor educators
- 5. Connect the American Tree Farm System and Project Learning Tree with a bright yellow bus
- 6. Promote the American Tree Farm System forest certification for family forest owners
- 7. Empower Tree Farmers to host a local school for a field trip to their forest
- 8. Promote Project Learning Tree as an outdoor education curriculum for educators
- 9. Inspire students to consider future employment as foresters, loggers, truckers, and sawmill workers
- 10. Connect schools and teachers with the Department of Natural Resources and US Forest Service
