The Simple Premise of Wheels to Woods

Problems:

- Urban and rural students are disconnected from nature (nature deficit disorder)
- Schools do not have adequate transportation funding for field trips



Solutions:

- Teachers want to take students outside to learn about forests and forest management
- Foresters, loggers, Tree
 Farmers, and the forest
 products community can
 pay for the bus

Wheels to Woods Pays for the Bus



Wheels to Woods Grants

- Up to \$350 per bus and \$1,000 per school
- PreK-12 schools and youth groups (Scouts, church, etc.)
- Transportation costs only
- Educational field trip in the forest
 - Forest or forest products company
- EASY for teachers to apply
 - Approved 111 of 114 applications

Wheels to Woods – 10 Objectives

- Promote the American Tree Farm System forest certification for family forest owners
- Promote Project Learning Tree as an outdoor education curriculum for teachers
- Connect the American Tree Farm System and Project Learning Tree with a bright yellow school bus
- Empower Tree Farmers to host a local school for a field trip to their certified Tree Farm
- Connect schools and teachers with the DNR and United States Forest Service



Wheels to Woods – 10 Objectives

- Get urban and rural students outside into the forest to experience nature
- Educate students about forests, forest management and forest products
- Support teachers and schools for field trips to a forest or forest products company
- Inspire students to become foresters, loggers, truckers, and sawmill workers
- Connect foresters and loggers with teachers and outdoor educators at nature centers



W2W Accomplishments in 2016

W2W impacted 8,279 people!

- 6,820 students
- 304 teachers
- 81 outdoor educators
- 1,074 parents
- 92 field trips
- Awarded \$31,433
- Only \$4.61 per student



Funding Wheels to Woods

- 55% public donations from USFS and DNR
- 45% private donations from foundations, foresters, loggers, and forest products companies

Donations to "Michigan Tree Farm Committee" are tax

- Only \$4.61 per student!
- \$175 per bus
- Raised \$32,250
- Awarded \$31,433

Wheels to Woods - 10 Step Process

- 1. Create guidelines and simple Application Form
 - www.WheelstoWoods.org
- Raise funds!
- 3. Distribute Application to teachers
 - Direct: Project Learning Tree network
 - Indirect: Tree Farmers & Inspectors
- 4. Accept Applications (any time)
- 5. Review and approve Applications



Wheels to Woods - 10 Step Process

- 6. Field trip occurs
 - Participate if possible
- 7. Review Reports and process payments



- 8. Track accomplishments and report to donors
- 9. Promote success stories
 - www.Facebook.com/MichiganTreeFarmSystem
- 10. Improve the model

My Ideal W2W Trip

- Teacher is PLT trained
- Forest is a certified Tree Farm
- A forester participates on the trip



- Students learn about forests ecosystems
- A logger cuts down a tree and mills it into lumber
- Students also learn about water, wildlife & recreation
- Many parents are chaperones
